Marion Co. Volunteer Firemen's Association 1969 Fiscal Report

The following, although late, is the compiled figures and statistics for 1969 of member departments of The Marion County Volunteer Firemen's Association. I apologize for its tardiness however, as everything is running about 6 months behind due to my unexpected and unwanted 6 month's vacation last September.

15 Fire Departments comprise The Marion County Volunteer Firemen's Association, serving approximately 280 square miles with a population of 481,500 residents based on the 1965 census.

15 Fire Departments, operating out of 32 station houses, manned by 1500 men, averaged 441 runs per station in 1969. Of the 1500 men, 613 are qualified and fully trained ambulance drivers and medical technicians.

5 Dispatch Centers handled the chores of disbursing the 14,093 runs of which 4,175 were fire, 4,663 rescue and first aid, and 5,255 ambulance trips to the hospital.

The apparatus making the 14,093 runs break down as follows: 78 fire apparatus, 20 rescue units, 20 ambulances and 8 chief vehicles.

This report does not include apparatus on order, or station houses under construction.

Figures are not available on property values, property losses, fatalities, or injuries.



New Unit For Fleming Garden Volunteers



This is a new unit recently delivered to the Fleming Garden Volunteer Fire Dept. Co. No. 3 of Wayne Township, Marion County. It is a Fire Rescue Unit carrying the following equipment: rescue saw, acetylene cutting outfit, resuscitator, stretchers, extra oxygen, blankets, smoke ejector, back boards, air masks, air tanks, and all fire equipment as per Pamphlet No. 19, including 1,200 Feet of 3" Yellow 100% Dacron Fire Hose. It has a 12,000 lb. front mounted winch and a portable A-frame that mounts on the front platform. Also there are four (4) 500 Watt Idion Quartz lights mounted above the pump. The lights are on sliding up and down posts. It also has a 3,500 Watt AC PTO driven generator and a 1000 G. M. 2-Stage Waterous fire pump. This apparatus is mounted on a 1970 Ford C900 with a Howe Fire Apparatus Co., of Anderson, Indiana Custom Canopy Cab.

Nationwide Presents Check for \$30,000

The broader benefits contained in the IVFA sponsored accident insurance policy came into sharp focus when a deputized bystander (a volunteer firemen from a nearby department) suffered a fatal heart attack while directing traffic at a recent fire. The victim was pressed into action by volunteer fire officials and therefore became eligible for coverage under their department's accident insurance policy underwritten by Nationwide Mutual Insurance Company.

His estate received a check for \$30,000 as a result of the loss which was \$10,000 in excess of the \$20,000 maximum required by Indiana statutes.

Robert McKean, Special Groups Manager for Nation-wide and George Flickinger, District Group Sales Manager, are pictured presenting the check to IVFA District No. 12 chairman, Harold Stofer and Chief Richard Lamb of the Wayne County Fire Department.

McKean and Flickinger pointed out that the special benefits which enabled Nationwide to pay this sum are generally not available under other policies where payments are limited to accidents occuring to firemen while in the performance of their duties. Coverage for heart and circulatory malfunctions and deputized bystanders has been a part of the IVFA policy since its inception in 1961.

Other special features in addition to the increased death

benefit, the heart and circulatory malfunction benefit and the bystander coverage includes increased benefits for total disability; no territorial restrictions; and Ladies' Auxiliary coverage.




A talk on the State Fire Marshal's Office was given by Frank Parillo.

Angola Breathed Easier After **Explosion Threat**

Angola's safety was threatened recently when a large amount of gasoline was accidentally spilled in the northwest part of the city. Just how serious the threat was became apparent in a report made by Angola Fire Chief Bill Good-

At 6:45 a. m. on July 21, the Angola Fire Department received a call to flush a gasoline spill at the Farm Bureau on West Mill Street. This started one of the most dangerous days for the City of Angola.

Many safeguards are taken by the Steuben County Farm Bureau to protect its property, employees and neighbors, but the human element can break down the finest of safety precautions.

According to the report Donald Silberman, a gasoline transport driver, arrived at the Farm Eureau to pump off his load. First he started to pump the gasoline into the wrong tank, then he got back into his truck and apparently went to sleep. About forty minutes later Bill Sutton, who lives nearby, smelled gasoline and upon investigation, found the tank overflowing and the driver asleep.

When the Angola Fire Department arrived on the scene the driver told them he thought about 100 gallons had been spilled. Upon investigation they found gasoline running six inches deep some three to four hundred feet north through the Catholic Church property which runs from Broad Street to the Moore Business Forms property on Mill Street. Upon further checking it was estimated that some 4500 gallons of gasoline had been spilled.

At this time a call was sent to Kendallville Fire Department for their foam unit and plans were developed to cover the exposed area with sand. The foam unit was on the scene and a cover of foam was soon over the exposed gasoline. An emergency call was placed to Fort Wayne for more foam and it was rushed to Angola in less than an hour.

Flushing of storm sewers in the area was started and State Conservation units were called in to check the area around Center Lake where the storm sewer empties.

The Angola Police Department officers were on the scene from early morning until late in the evening controlling the








the TASK FORCE TIP

Chief C. H. McMillan of the Gary FIRE TASK FORCE, an eight company volunteer operation specializing in heavy streams on major blazes in the heavily industrialized Calumet Region of Northwest Indiana. "This new fully automatic tip will do the figuring for you to always produce the best possible stream from the water available to it.'

How many times after a big blaze have the news reports included a statement to the effect that "firemen were hampered by low water pressure"? Today's pumpers are readily capable of any pressure required for firefighting, but only if they have the water to work with. A pumper can and does make pressure, but it can't make water. When too many and/or too large of nozzles are connected to the pumper for the water quantity available, proper pressure cannot be maintained at the nozzles, the consequence being weak and ineffective streams lobbing into the fire, rather than the tearing, penetrating streams necessary to get at the seat of the blaze.

Proper tip sizes can be selected to balance the handlines and deluge devices to apply the available volume at proper nozzle pressure; indeed, this is the main theme of the fire hydraulics manuals. At the training ground or fire school this all works out very well when the layout is carefully pre-planned, calculated, and a minimum of potential troubles (burst line, pumper trouble, etc.) are likely to occur. Plenty of time is available, and most important, usually plenty of water is available, or at least the supply conditions are fairly well known and not subject to change as additional pumpers take suction, level falls in nearby supply watertowers, strainers clog, or relay pumpers fail to pump properly. Under relaxed, comfortable, daylight conditions, the drillmaster then walks around with his pitot gauge and predictably measures close to desired pressure on each beautiful stream. If not, (oops, somebody goofed!) a leisurely recalculation and a shut down for a change or two is no problem, even if the necessary tips aren't immediately available, and someone has to drive back to the station to row through a drawer of old spares!

In practice nearly the complete reverse is more likely to be true; as with "Murphy's Law": "Everything that can go wrong, will!" Though most firefighters and chiefs hate to admit it, poor streams are more the rule. Even if the nozzle pressures are not low, they are then usually too high, resulting in unnecessary strain on men and equipment, and undue feathering and breakup of streams. The greater the size of the fire, the greater the chance for error, especially when elevated and master streams are brought into play. Under actual fire conditions even when errors are recognized they are frequently not corrected, for to correct would require a shut down, and there appears to be a general stigma when the fight is hot that a few moments interruption cannot be

"Throw away 2(Q2) + Q and your hydraulics books!" says afforded, even though to do so may make far more water available. A particular example of this is where a hydrant connection has been made with one or two 21/2" lines and a short shut down to change to a large suction will more than double the available volume of water into the pumper. As more and more streams are opened, and especially when big streams are started, all are trying to rob water from each other. Numerous piddling streams pecking at the fringe of the fire and backing up as short reach causes positions to become untenable may satisfy the unknowledgeable that he is doing all he can to put it out. In such cases the fire is not realy being fought, but merely being allowed to burn down to a size that can be put out! A few, even just one good master stream can frequently do far more toward getting to the heart of the fire and cutting it down to hand line size.

> Chief McMillan can suggest parting with the hydraulics book because the device he has developed (Patent Pending) automatically and continuously solves the master stream hydraulics problems more accurately than could be done with a slide rule and a truck load of nozzle tips, yet the device is very basic and extremely simple. Being a Scotchman with a limited budget, Chief McMillan also designed the device so that it could be applied to existing large fog tips such as the Akron "Black Widow" or Elkhart "Jumbo Select-O-Stream". Smaller versions for use with 11/2" and

21/2" handlines are being developed. Although the fog tips with which the device is used are termed "constant gallonage", this refers to maintenance of a constant flow as pattern is varied from straight stream through varying angles of fog pattern. Such tips without the Task Force Tip modification have flow variance according to nozzle pressure just as straight bore tips. Actually it is more accurate to say the reverse: nozzle pressure varies according to the flow supplied to the nozzle. Overall performance of any standard nozzle, be it straight bore or fog is pedicated on having sufficient flow supplied to it to fill the fixed opening to the desired pressure.

A short history of the development of fog nozzles should be helpful in understanding the Task Force Tip and how it functions. The first fire fighting fog nozzles developed a fog pattern by having a series of holes producing small streams angled so as to impinge to cause a breakup of the pattern. The well known "Navy" (Continued on Page 11)


type nozzle combines an appropriately sized straight bore and interacting shut-off valve in what is still (after better than thirty years) one of the best and most widely used firefighting standbys. The drawback to this type nozzle is the single angle of fog pattern available, as well as variation of nozzle pressure with applied flow. Adjustable fog in firefighting size became available in the next generation of fog nozzles in what amounted to a king-sized version of the old familiar rotary shut-off garden hose nozzle. Here the outer sleeve was movable in relation to a fixed center baffle such that as the outer sleeve was turned, flow varied from shut-off through straight stream to wide fog in the maximum opening. Although many such nozzles were produced and are still widely used, this type of nozzle suffers an inherant problem which magnifies with size. The problem is the variation in flow area with change in pattern; flow is almost twice as great in wide fog as in straight stream, thus it is literally impossible for a pump operator to continuously supply correct pressure, if pattern is being varied. What is worse is that pressure drops most in the fog pattern where it is most desired.

The so called "constant gallonage" fog nozzle was devised as a solution to the above problem. In this nozzle the baffle remains fixed in relation to the body while an outer cylindrical sleeve is moved in or out to shape the desired stream or fog pattern angle such that the flow (and nozzle pressure) remains constant irrespective of pattern changes. This tip does not, however, maintain constant flow with respect to changing supply conditions. A later modification to this type made the baffle movable in relation to the body by addition of an intermediate body such that it could be set for expected flow. Though this type of nozzle has been on the market in handline and smaller sizes for years, its availability in master stream size is relatively recent.

The Task Force Tip goes a step further by automatically varying the baffle position to maintain constant water pressure. As one attempts to apply more volume to the nozzle, the nozzle pressure tends to raise; however, with the Task Force Tip the baffle quickly repositions at exactly the required greater opening to accommodate the increased volume at the original constant pressure. Conversely, if supply drops, the baffle closes up to again maintain constant optimum pressure. It will handle flow from essentially zero (baffle fully closed) through full design range with less than five psi (not detectable visually, pressure gauge required) change in nozzle pressure. Above this point the tip acts conventionally as a fixed baffle, flow increasing according to the amount of over pressure applied.

The Task Force Tip is very compact and fits within the business end of the fog tip, actually inside of the stream in operation. To install, the fixed baffle is screwed out of the conventional tip and replaced by the threaded stem of the TFT. The movable baffle is next slipped onto the stem. The outer end of the baffle is also a hydraulic piston. The third major part is the hydraulic cylinder which is slipped onto the baffle-piston (with a return spring between) and screwed onto the outer end of the stem. A small bleed hole in the baffle-piston permits nozzle pressure to communicate to the cylinder chamber; essentially constant pressure is maintained within the cylinder by a bleed off valve located in the center of the cylinder and discharging into the center of the stream. In essence the pressure within the cylinder acting on the baffle-piston balances the nozzle pressure within the nozzle body. Changes in supply result in imbalances which cause the baffle to move to re-establish balance at the proper flow opening according to the supply.

The accompanying photos show the Task Force Tip and streams produced with it at varying flows. Of course, the total stream is dependent on both volume and pressure. A greater volume carries greater energy and will move greater air mass, thus achieving greater reach. The point to be made is that the Task Force Tip delivers whatever is supplied to it with stream quality equal to the best that can be obtained with a proper tip sized for that quantity. In other words, if but 250 gpm are available, the TFT will deliver it in a stream equivalent to a handline with a proper tip for 250 gpm. This might prove especially effective on a ladder pipe where only the flow of one $2\frac{1}{2}$ line is needed, yet to fill a conventional ladder pipe (or elevating platform) would require two or three lines. Also it should be noted that to photograph a stream close enough to show detail in the stream requires getting partially behind it at an oblique angle which may not do justice

to the straightness and reach of the stream, thus additional photos from a distance are included to properly illustrate reach.

The Task Force Tip can be used with any combination of one, two, three or four $2\frac{1}{2}$ " lines, or equivalent flow capacities in larger lines, on deluge sets, ladder pipes, elevating platform pipes, deck guns, etc. The Gary FIRE TASK FORCE has found an excellent lay to be two $2\frac{1}{2}$ " (budget doesn't yet permit 3") lines laid straight in from a pumper already at work with one or two handlines. The two lines are then siamesed into the pumper intake and fed through the pump into the direct connected deck gun. Since the FTF pumper is building the necessary nozzle pressure, the supply pumper pressure has only the friction loss to the FTF pumper to overcome. A glance at a friction loss table (maybe the

book should be kept around for figuring out what you did, after the fire) shows that 500 gpm per line can be moved at a friction loss of 55 psi per hundred feet, thus the supply pumper need maintain only about 120 psi (allowing for a 10 psi residual at the FTF pumper) to supply a 1000 gpm deck stream, if the lines are 200 feet long. What about the line or two already off the supply pumper? Experience has indicated that if the plug is a good one, capable of producing the required flow with 15 or 20 psi residual, a 1000 gpm rated pumper can easily supply the total flow of 1500 gpm. Gary tests produced as high as 2200 gpm (measured with pitot gauge on two deluge sets being supplied) from a rated 1000 gpm pumper, and 2400+ gpm with a 1500 gpm rated engine.


Even if the supply pumper cannot supply as much as might be desired (the operator judges either by pulling the plug down to minimum suction pressure, best judged by using a large soft suction and pulling down to where the suction can be squeezed by hand; or maximum engine load, either as indicated by full throttle or by reaching maximum allowable engine rpm), with the Task Force Tip whatever is available, be it 500, 700, or what, is delivered at correct nozzle pressure. If more water is desired at the deck gun, one of the handlines can be put into it, or a third line can be laid to another pumper. An excellent stream will be working all the while, with still greater volume when the third line is charged.

The original Task Force Tip was first used at an extra alarm fire in a large hardware store in Gary on July 1, 1968. In the ensuing two years plus, several additional tips have been put in service. Practically every use has demonstrated unforeseen advantages, often permitting master stream use under conditions which would have otherwise been difficult, if not impossible. A prime example was a recent fire in a nearby small town where the hydrant system was capable of only a limited flow. One FTF aerial truck was supplied two lines from a nearby pumper drawing all that was available from the plug, estimated at 450-500 gpm. With the TFT this provided an excellent stream with reach all the way across the block. A second FIRE TASK FORCE ladder truck was positioned around the corner beside the rear of the fire buildings where only one $2\frac{1}{2}$ " line could be had, and through a relay to boot. From time to time a second line could be furnished by tank trucks, a perfect situation for the Task Force Tip with a consistently good stream, simply better when the additional flow was available!

While the TFT is designed for use with deluge devices, an expensive device is actually not required for effective use of a Task Force Tip. A single 50 foot length of 21/2" hose taken directly off the pumper and adequately tied about three feet from the TFT to a telephone pole, parking meter, car bumper, truck, or any other adequate support can be used for a very creditable deluge stream. Approximately 700 gpm can be pushed through 50' of 21/2" hose at about a 50 psi friction loss (105 psi loss per hundred feet by the tables), thus allowing 100 psi for nozzle pressure means that the pumper must operate at 150 psi. A little more or less makes no particular difference to the TFT. With a short length of hose, say 25', greater flow can be had.

Another poor man's deluge device which can also be extremely useful even to the department with unlimited budget, carries the above technique one step further by adding a relatively inexpensive siamese ahead of the short length. This set-up is particularly useful on a roof or tied to a cross bar in a window of an adjacent building, and permits two lines to be siamesed into a heavy stream without the bulk of a deluge gun. Use of 3" hose coupled 21/2" should be even better.
