You can check over the treasurer's report and see that we have just finished another very good financial year. I can report that the membership has run over the 12,000th mark right close to the first of the New Year. Also can report that a State Senator has called this office for some details on the present bills before the General Assembly. This was a first for this office to be called for information—that is since I have been Secretary.

Now sum all that up and it can be called nothing else but success. Yes, when you have been recognized and still growing that is the time when you can say "You have arrived". It is only with the help of each individual member and each individual department help that this can be accomplished. No one man or set of officers can do the job alone. You can not elect anyone to do the job alone. It is quite discouraging to ask from the membership for something by any committee and get very sparing results.

Have you stopped to realize just what power is invested in IVFA? Take 12,000 plus members—say all married, that is 24,000—count fathers, mothers, sisters, brothers, etc., plus some friends we must have. How many voices are we counting now? Yes, we do have a large voice and we can use it if one and all will help. The people we send to Indianapolis to do our bidding will do so if we can only tell them what we wish.

We have a Building Administration Council that is trying to take over the Fire Marshal's Office department of plan inspection and building inspection. Efforts have been made in the past to do away with the Fire Marshal's Office and we have saved it. Now is the time to get to work again or else I

am afraid that we are once again in the same danger. For the Volunteer Fire Service the Fire Marshal is the only office that we can go to for help beyond our local say so. We need that office to help us beyond our local grasp. More information can be gotten about this at your district meeting and I would strongly advise some kind of action by all.

One other thing that has come up with regularity this past year has been the question of how far can I get with the Blue Light? Let's remember once and for all that the Blue Light only asks for permission from any motorist to yield you the right of way and that you are a volunteer fireman responding to an emergency. Don't forget your obligation to provide for your family far out-reaches any obligation to get caught doing wrong trying to out-do the other guy. I might add that this also goes for driving fire trucks. If a truck doesn't get to the emergency for any reason at all it might just have well have stayed in the station and saved all a lot of worry.

Yes, we are Volunteers and proud of it, but let's do it with safety and courtesy for not only ourselves but to all those we

IVFA SPONSORED

LEGISLATION PASSES

Legislation this year for the IVFA as well as the usual sponsoring of certain bills, took on a different aspect. We were confronted this year with certain bills that if they were passed, may have been very detrimental to Volunteer Firemen in the State of Indiana.

The Firemen's Association sponsored two bills as follows:

No. 1 — Senate Bill No. 353 changed the fire protection districts bill to restrict them only to counties in the state in which there exists rural water systems. This bill passed the Senate 45-0, and the House 87-0.

No. 2 — Senate Bill No. 301 was introduced as the spark arrester bill and after opposition by the railroads, a compromise was reached and a new bill submitted to require the railroads to reimburse Volunteer Fire Departments for fighting fires caused by any railroad. This bill passed the Senate 37-5 and the House 87-4.

COMMITTEE KILLS AMBULANCE BILL

The House Public Health Committee recently killed Rep. John Mahoney's proposal for state standards for ambulance equipment and attendant training.

By an 8-to-6 vote, with Indianapolis committee members most strongly opposed, the committee turned down a motion to report out a trimmed version of Mahoney's original bill.

Mahoney proposed a \$5 million appropriation for distribution to local government ambulance services brought up to standards set by the National Highway Safety Act. The money clause was deleted today to meet cost objections, but the pilot didn't work.

The bill was advocated as a way of saving lives on highways between cities that already have professional ambulance service, and in rural areas too thinly settled to support first-class emergency service.

On penalty of lost federal highway funds, the highway safety act required compliance with several points, such as ambulance service.

Mahoney said funeral directors some volunteer fire departments and the Indiana State Police helped defeat his bill. The state police, the former Hammond police chief said, were afraid their helicopter wouldn't meet the bill's standards.

WORST SARATOGA FIRE IN 10 YEARS GUTS BUILDING IN 4 HOUR BLAZE

Saratoga volunteer firemen were kept busy fighting in sub-zero degree temperatures recently.

Over 40 firemen responded to fire calls in Saratoga to battle the worst fire there in over ten years. At about 4 p. m., Ward township volunteer firemen were called to the home of Ray Quintero where they quickly determined the seriousness of the blaze. Calls for assistance were immediately put out to the White River and Union City volunteer fire departments. Union City also sent an emergency ambulance.

The building, owned by Quintero, had once been a hotel. At the time of the fire, five people in two families were residing there. All escaped without incident, and are reported staying with neighbors.

According to Merritt Manning, a Ward township volunteer fireman, the fire fighting lasted about 4 hours. "One of the main problems," he said, "was trying to stay warm. We had to work in sub-zero degree temperatures." Most of the men, it was reported, were completely covered with ice during the blaze.

Another problem was keeping the fire confined to the one building. Saratoga town marshal, Bob Smiley, said another building, also owned by Quintero, was located only a few feet away and major efforts to keep the outside cool were undertaken. "The firemen didn't spray much water on the other building," he said, "but they sure worked to keep the blaze down on the old hotel." It is estimated that over 10,000 gallons of water were sprayed on the building.

Smiley said that most of the furnishings in the burning building were saved. "The building," he said, "is a total loss. The only thing remaining is its structure."

On hand to aid the firemen in keeping warm was the Ward township women's auxiliary. Coffee and chili soup was served to all firemen and helpers at the City Building.

According to Saratoga town marshal, only one injury was reported: Fire Chief Raymond Heston suffered a sprained ankle when he slipped on the ice.

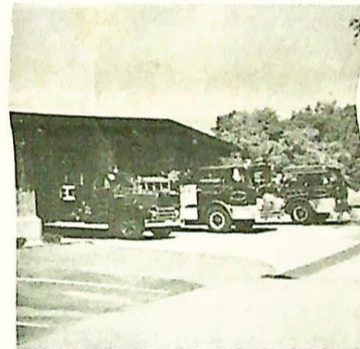

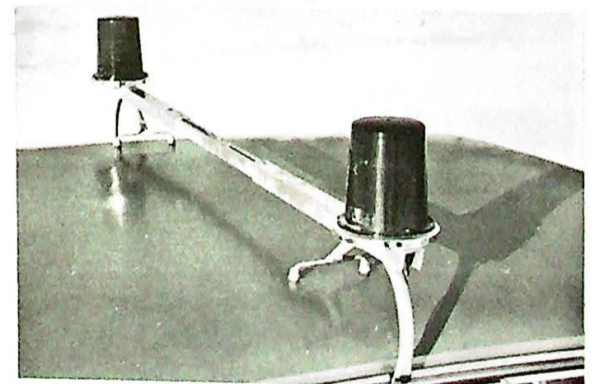

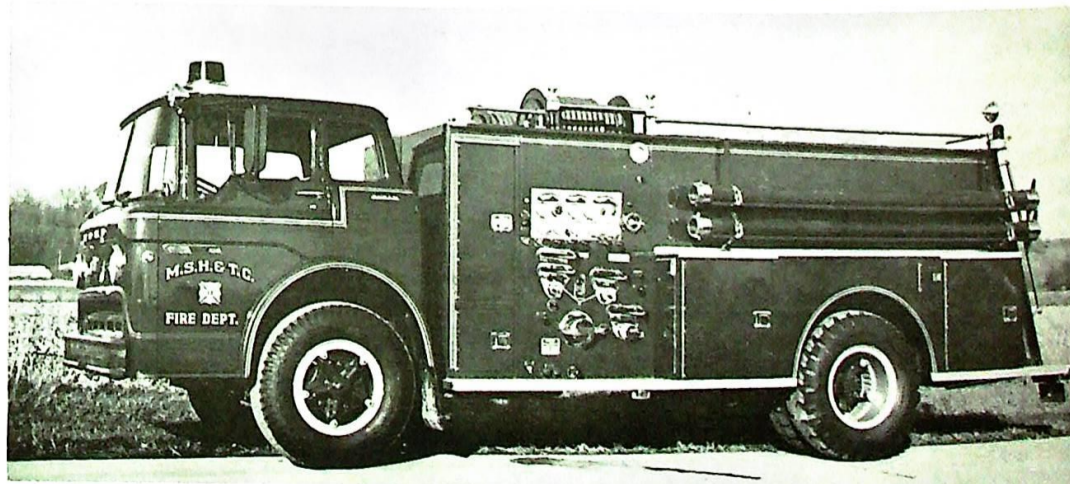

SPEEDWAY VOLUNTEERS PHASE-OUT OPERATION

An era of Speedway history will come to an end on December 31.

Regretfully, we, the remaining members of the Speedway Volunteer Fire Department, voted to phase out this section of the department.

The Volunteer Department was organized in 1916, when the town had 500 residents. Our first fire chief was Art Beeler. Walter Blase, one of the first volunteers appointed in 1928, rose to the rank of captain, which he now holds, and has served Speedway ever since.

Our department grew, and at one time its members included Clarence Cagle, Roy King, Hap Bernhardt, Paul Nester, Vince Rolles, Bob Dietrich, Foster Bur-

cope, Don Hammer, Bob Quillen and many more dedicated men that realized that Speedway had to be protected from the demon 'FIRE.'

As the town grew, the need for additional men and up-to-date equipment grew. The first paid firefighters employed by the town were Cledith Stephens, who later became chief, and Louis Trosky. Both were hired in 1943.

From a volunteer department in 1916 to a fully paid department in 1971, many men passed through the department. The volunteers served the town of Speedway for 55 years, faithfully rising to the call of anyone in trouble, regardless of time or weather or personal jobs.

Speedway now has a very competent fire department, better trained and younger, managed by good officers and directed by Chief Ed Sowell and Assistant Chief Harry Downs.

The Volunteers met on Oct. 5, and cast the fateful vote. Our work is done and we pass along to the paid men the job of keeping Speedway residents and their homes and businesses safe from fire.

So it is farewell to the Volunteers and Hail to the Paid men.

Officers of the group are Noah Beck, president; Jack Click, vice-president; John F. Beeson, secretary; and William Anderson, treasurer. Walter Blase and Roy Houpt also are volunteers.

The remaining members voted to cease operations at the end of the year. Chief Earl Sowell told us to keep our gear and we would be placed on stand-by.

Speedway has about 30 paid firefighters who are well trained and very efficient. The citizens of Speedway can rest assured that their needs in time of trouble will be well taken care of.

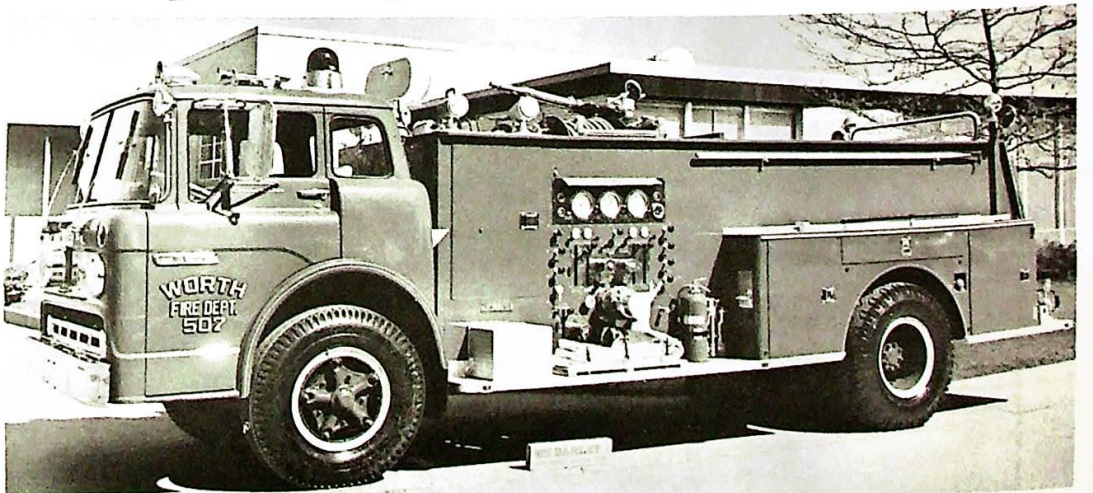

FREMONT VOLUNTEER 1971 ACTIVITIES

The Fremont Volunteer Fire Department has closed their 1971 year with a total of 131 fire runs, of which number 69 runs were for grass or trash fires; five truck fires; four tractor fires; one mini-bike fire and sixteen cars or pickups on fire.

The Fremont Firemen were also called a number of times to assist other nearby Fire Departments with equipment and man power, together with the Fremont Firemen receiving help from nearby fire departments on a number of their fire runs.

A total of 1459 man hours

were spent at the fire runs, with 492 of these being spent at the grass or trash fires.

The largest fire during the year was the Eaton Spring Trout Club.

The Fremont Volunteer Fire Department has added a new 1971 one-ton International truck to its arsenal of fire fighting equipment. It replaces a 1937 Chevy truck. The new truck is a 4-wheel drive, and has a 400 gallon water tank and a front mounted pump. Also mounted on the truck are two hose reels with 350 feet of 3/4 inch hose; one length of 4 inch suction hose; 50 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose; 50 feet of 1 1/2 inch hose; a small ladder; two Indian hand pump extinguishers; a number of rakes, brooms and flappers.

The main purpose of the ve-

hicle is to fight grass fires, but is suitable for small fires as the truck can also be hooked up to a water hydrant.

The Fremont Department has four other trucks, including a 1400 gallon water tank truck and one equipped boat and resuscitator.

Elmer Higbee is the Fire Chief; Don Palmerton, assistant Chief. 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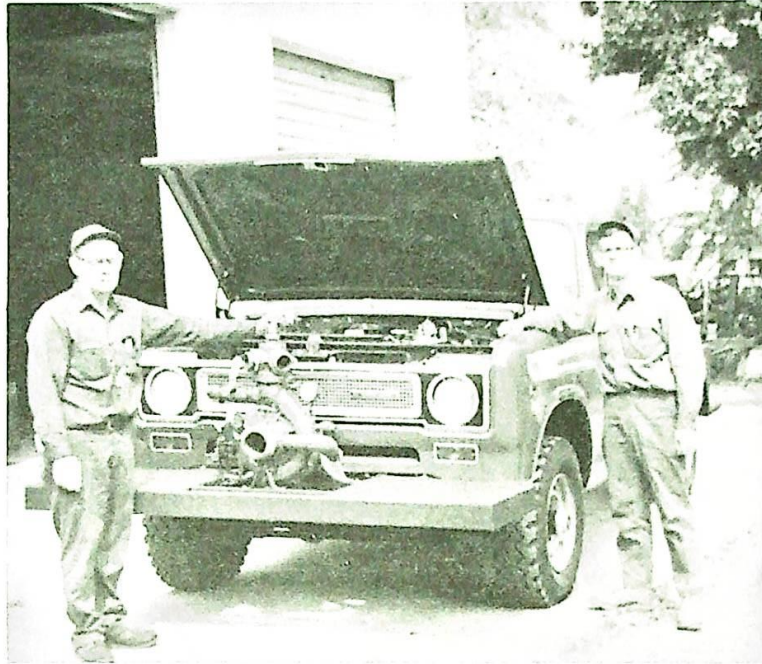

BY-LAWS

RESOLUTION—RE: ASSISTANT TREASURER AND EXPENSE ALLOWANCE

We the members of the Volunteer Fire Departments in Dist. No. 1 and No. 2 of the Indiana Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc. in a meeting duly assembled at Lake Eliza, County of Porter, State of Indiana, on Nov. 17, 1971, there being a quorum of the members and departments in good standing present, do unanimously pass, adopt and present the following resolution for consideration of the Indiana Volunteer Firemen's Association;

WHEREAS: District 1 and 2 officers, and members, who being familiar with the increased responsibilities and duties of our Treasurer, and

WHEREAS: Due to the approx. 12,000 or more membership of the Indiana Volunteer Firemen's Association, Inc., approx. 900 checks from approx. 600 local fire departments, banks and equipment suppliers are presently being processed annually and distributed thru the four (4) funds maintained by the Association, and

WHEREAS: Approx. 450 checks thru these four (4) funds are issued plus cash vouchers numbering approx. 500 envelopes annually are also presently being processed by the Treasurer, and

WHEREAS: Increased paper work, accounting, letter writing, telephone work, bookkeeping, etc., causing approx. 1200 pieces of mail to be dispatched annually by the Treasurer; also property care, public utility expense and approx. 1500 man hours required annually for the proper performance of the office, now therefore be it

RESOLVED: that Art. I, Section I, add an "Assistant Treasurer" Line 4. Pg. 6; that Art. 2, Section 3, Lines 7, 8, 9, page 10 change to include the expense allowance of the Assistant Treasurer; Sec. 6, Pg. 8, to read as follows: The expense allowance of the Assistant Treasurer shall be Two and one half cents (2.5c) per member per year; and be it further

RESOLVED: that this Assistant Treasurer be recommended by the treasurer now in office, and approved by the board of directors, so as to provide him with a person in an area close enough that they may work together in their respective offices; and be it further

RESOLVED: that the adoption of this resolution will increase the financial safety of the Association by placing a third officer in a bonded responsibility of its resources in the same manner as the present Treasurer and Secretary thereof, and be it further

RESOLVED: that the By-Law changes above proposed become effective July 1, 1972.

MARION COUNTY

1971 FISCAL REPORT

The 15 member departments of The Marion County Volunteer Firemen's Association have compiled their statistics and figures for 1971.

This year's figures have been broken down further than in years past, in order to achieve a more accurate look at the fire and rescue services provided in Marion County, outside the boundaries of The Indianapolis Fire Department. Next year's figures will be broken down even further.

A total of 17,246 runs were made in 1971 of which 4,553 were fire runs, 5,707 first aid runs, 6,686 ambulance runs (trips to hospital) and 300 unclassified runs.

133 pieces of apparatus responding from 34 stations, dispatched from 5 Radio Centers, covered 288 square miles with a population of 515,062. (1970 Census).

The 1,016 firemen utilized 22,028 pieces of apparatus in answering the 17,246 alarms. The 34 fire companies broke down the 4,553 Fire Runs as follows:

NATIONAL FIRE PROTECTION ISSUES

ANNUAL REPORT

Fire killed approximately 12,200 people in the United States during 1971, according to preliminary estimates by the National Fire Protection Association. This is the same number of fatalities experienced the previous year.

However, deaths in dwelling fires in 1971 rose by 100, to a total of 6,600.

Property destroyed by fire during the past year totaled \$2.845 billion, the preliminary estimates indicate, an increase of approximately \$215 million over 1970.

Of the property loss total, \$2.335 billion represents damage to buildings and contents. Non-building fires—those involving aircraft, ships, motor vehicles and similar equipment, as well as forests—cost about \$510 million.

The worst loss-of-life fire in 1971 occurred at East Haven, Connecticut, on June 7, when 28 died in the fire following the crash of a Convair 580 airliner. There were 24 killed in a fire and explosion in a munitions manufacturing plant at Brunswick, Georgia, on February 3.

The worst property-loss fires of last year were the \$10 million loss of a ship under construction at Lorain, Ohio, on June 24, and a similar loss in a fire at a nuclear power plant under construction at Indian Point, New York. Both loss figures are subject to final adjustment.

Internationally, the Christmas Day fire disaster at the Taeyongak Hote in Seoul, Korea, in which the death toll now stands at 156, is the worst since the Brussels, Belgium, department store fire of May 22, 1967, which killed 325 customers and employees.

President List addressed the assembly and discussed the past years achievements as well as the events of 1972 which would see legislation introduced by The Association for better fire and rescue services.

Three Speedway firemen — Jack Reynolds, Al Shortridge, and Steve Moody — and Fred Marlowe, the father-in-law of Moody, deserve more than just a pat on the back for their heroic efforts Friday, Jan. 28, as they desperately tried to save the lives of two drowning fishermen near Cloverdale, Ind.

The four were ice fishing on a pond at Camp Otto near

Cloverdale, when they saw a fisherman nearby fall through the ice. As his friend tried to grab him he also fell in.

One of the four local men went for a boat and rope and they all began a rescue attempt which was regrettably unsuccessful.

During the attempted rescue, Reynolds also slipped in, but Mr. Marlowe pulled him out.

And Shortridge dived into the ice water in an attempt to tie the rope around one of the dunked fishermen who couldn't hold on any longer.

Reynolds explained, "It took some time to get the boat and line and when a person falls through ice like that he can't last very long because of the temperature."

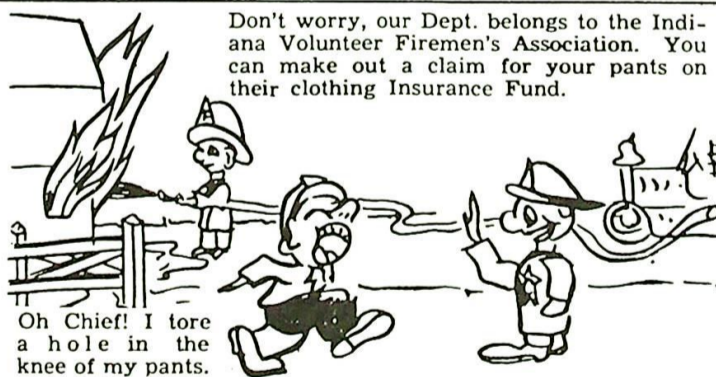
NEW PUMPER IN SERVICE IN WAYNE TWP. NO. 2 FORT WAYNE



Wayne Township No. 2 Fort Wayne recently placed a new 1250 GPM pumper in service. Built by the Howe Apparatus Co., the pump incorporates a midship mount control, 2½" preconnected foam generator capable of producing 10,000 sq. ft. of foam per minute. The PTO power generator supplies auxiliary power

for the truck. 2200 feet of 2½" hose is carried on the truck.

A 1000 gal. per minute pumper and a 3000 gal. pumper tanker, the largest ever built by the Howe Apparatus Co. will be delivered to the department in March of this year.

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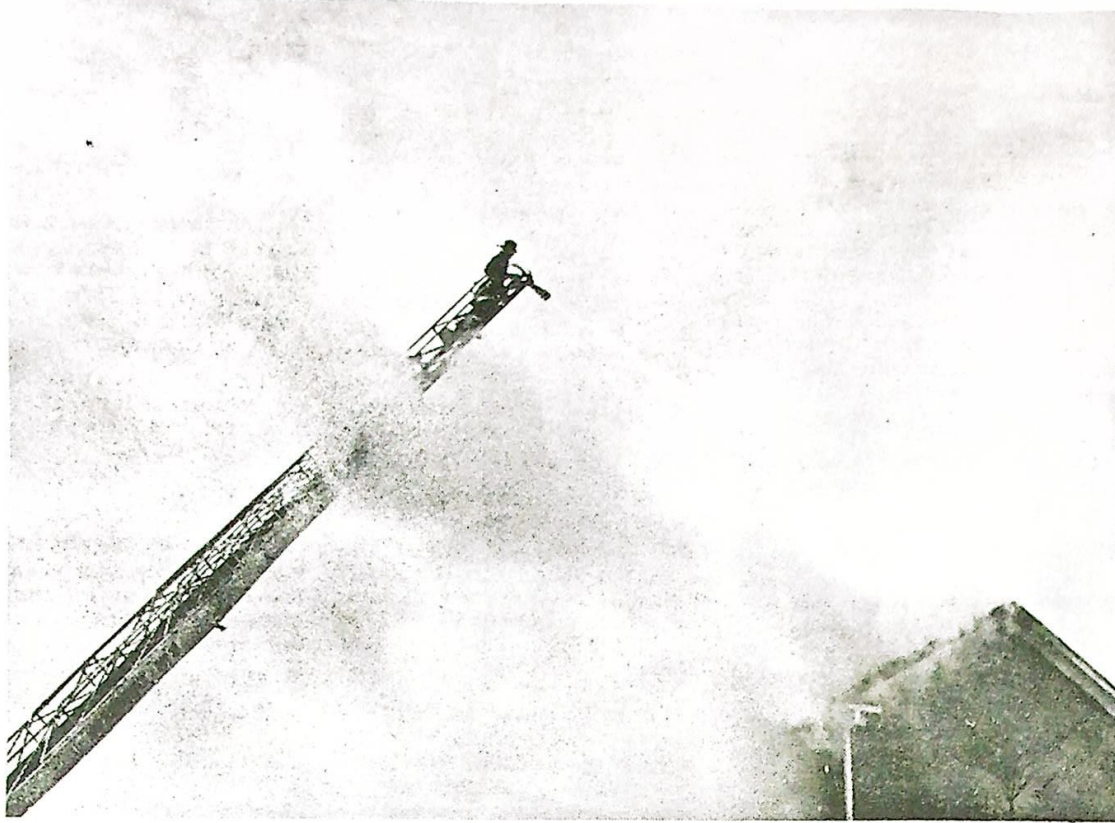

Blowtorch Causes \$10,000 Fire At Westchester

Chuck Hammond, Speedway fireman, aims the big fire hose high above the Westchester Apartments fire which gutted the inside of John Hogan's apartment at 2104 White Oaks Dr., Speedway, last Friday. This was the first

time the big aerial ladder truck was used. The new piece of fire-fighting equipment allowed the fire eaters to pour tons of water down into the flame and stop the fire from spreading. The snorkel worked fine, but Hammond wound up with frost-bitten ears.

The snorkel, object of some controversy, was given credit for stopping the fire from spreading by Assistant Fire Chief Harry Downs. One long-time Speedway resident said it was the "biggest fire that Speedway had seen in many years."

Speedway firemen received the call at 9:53 a. m. Since it was an apartment fire, all three pieces of equipment were sent. However, Assistant Chief Harry Downs said that "if the department had not had the ladder truck, the entire building could have been lost."

Firemen were able to use the ladder to get above the fire which was blazing from the roof and pour water on it.

"This would have been impossible with an ordinary pumper truck," Downs said, "It was a lifesaver—when it (the fire) broke through the roof, we could cover it from up above." The fire started when two maintenance men were attempting to defrost frozen pipes in the apartment of John Hogan. The blowtorch they were using started the fire, fire department officials said.

Most of the damage was in the Hogan apartment, but the apartment of 75-year-old Mrs. Louise Krund, downstairs, was damaged by water and smoke.

FIRE GUTS APARTMENT
Fire gutted the inside of an apartment at 2104 White Oaks Dr. in Westchester Apartments Friday, Feb. 4. Speedway Fire Chief Edward Sowell estimated damage to contents and structure at more than \$10,000.

Neither occupants of the upper or lower level of the apartment were injured, but Lt. David Watson of the fire department was taken to Methodist Hospital with frost-bitten arms and hands. The temperature during the morning hovered near 6 above and the chill factor was near 35 below.

TRAINING

COORDINATOR

The Indiana Fire Chiefs Association decided at their Board of Directors Meeting on January 7, 1972 that the best way to develop a statewide training program for fire fighters is to retain a dedicated, qualified coordinator to do this work on a part time basis. This is a request for applicants from those individuals who are interested in accepting this challenge.

The responsibilities of this Training Coordinator will consist of, but not be limited to, the following areas:

1. Develop, in cooperation with the training committee of the Indiana Fire Fighters As-

sociation, a two (2) day (Saturday and Sunday) conference in three (3) different locations of the state, north, central and south.

2. Advertise and promote within the various county or regional organizations, such schools as they feel may be necessary for the education of their membership.

3. Provide an outline of training courses available to individual small fire departments in basic, advanced, and specialized fire fighting tactics. The course outlines are to be developed by and in cooperation with the Indiana Instructors Association who will probably provide the bulk of the instruction personnel.

4. Organize statewide schools at some convenient location to teach specialized subjects such as; fire prevention education, officer training, fire apparatus maintenance and testing, instructor training, etc.

Some programs of the above type have been hell in recent years under various sponsorship. What seems to be lacking

is a coordinated effort from year to year so that a rounded education program is available for all fire fighters, both paid and volunteer. The Training Coordinator will be expected to work statewide with fire fighters at all levels to promote and encourage this training and interest. In a real sense, the opportunities are unlimited.

The Fire Chiefs Association has appointed a committee to prepare these specifications and to interview applicants for this position. A complete outline of education and qualifications should be forwarded to Chief Ed Sowell, Speedway Fire Department, Speedway, Indiana 46224.

Pay for this Coordinator will be on hourly plus mileage basis. The Chief's Association is willing to provide \$2,000 the first year for the activities of this Training Coordinator.

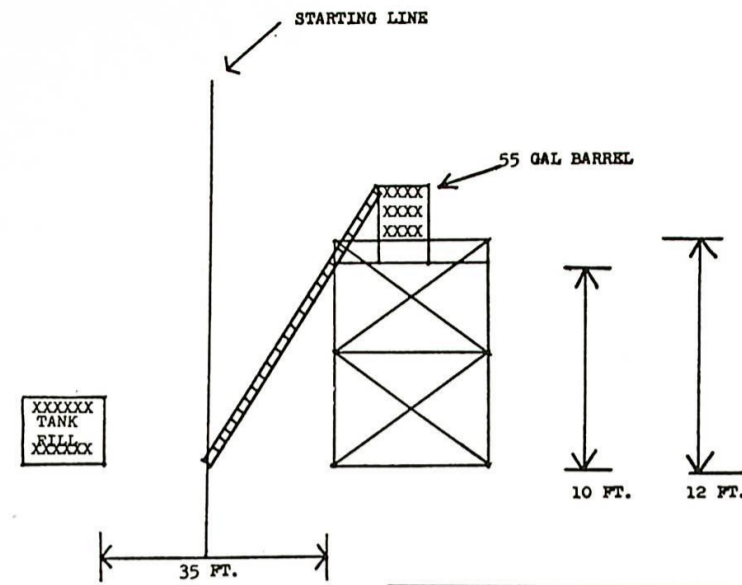

Bucket Brigade Competition:



OBJECT:

To fill a 55 gallon barrel with water, using buckets.

Six members on a team against time.

SPECIFICATIONS:

There will be a 55 gallon barrel on top of a scaffolding 10 ft. tall. A ladder will be set from ground to top of barrel. A portable water tank to be 35 feet from base of scaffold. There will be 5 buckets for use by each team. Each player must wear a fire helmet and good treaded boots or sneakers.

PLAY:

Play starts with three members on ladder and three at base of ladder, five buckets are also at base of ladder. At starting signal, the three bucketmen grab buckets run to fill tank fill up and run back to laddermen. The laddermen **MUST** stay on ladder at all times. The laddermen **MUST** straddle rung of ladder at all times. The bucketman gives full bucket to lowest man on ladder who passes bucket on up to next man till bucket reaches top and is dumped in barrel. The top man **must** throw bucket down to a bucket-carrier, who **MUST** catch bucket then proceed to refill. **NO BUCKET CARRIER** may have more than one bucket in his possession at a time.

PENALTIES:

25 seconds penalty will be assessed for carrying more than one filled bucket.

5 seconds penalty for dropping or not catching a bucket.

JUDGES:

A timing judge will be on scaffold next to barrel to start contest and to judge when barrel is full.

streams of water. Second whistle go. After that you may move anywhere on the playing court.

6. Back Nozzle Guard may turn on nozzle when ball reaches your own 7½ foot mark. She may leave on her stream until the ball is returned to the 3 ft. mark from center. She may not move in front

of her 40' line.

7. There is a coach for front nozzle and a coach for back nozzle. The back coach may put her foot on the hose to help steady the guard or if needed may hold the hose. She may not touch the nozzle in any way or the team is disqualified. Also the head coach

8. A helmet must be worn plus suitable rain gear. Boots or good treaded sneakers may be worn on the feet.

COMPARE YOUR TRAINING

Some might say that it is a tongue-in-check approach but if you stop to consider the content, the efficiency of your training program can be affected seriously as well as your fire-ground operations. Credit for this column must be given to Senior Instructor R. B. "Skip" Smith, University of Maryland, published in the Fire Service Bulletin, March 21, 1963.

HOW NOT TO HOLD A DRILL OBJECTIVE:

This issues article is designed to provide a means of assessing the training efforts and accomplishments of your department. It is written in a negative manner in hopes of attracting the attention of the readers most in need of training assistance.

GENERAL SUGGESTIONS:

A. Call a special meeting of all of your line officers and discuss this article with them. After this meeting with the officers, discuss your year's drill schedule and procedures for holding drills with the entire membership.

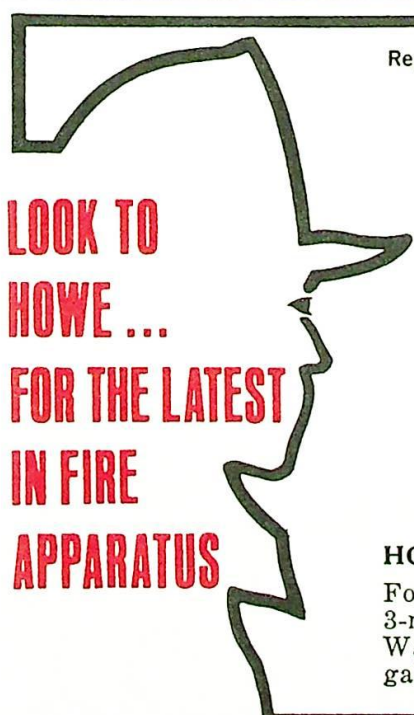
B. Do your drills consist of any of the following?

1. A social meeting once a month or less.
2. A "Bull Session" after the regular monthly business meeting.
3. A once a year trip to the nearest hydrant to squirt water.
4. An opportunity to race through town with the siren blowing until the driver gets tired.
5. A chance to get a crowd together to play cards.
6. The time to paint the firehouse, wax the floors or fix the plumbing.
7. A meeting of the "cliques" to heckle the workers.
8. A meeting of the "six regular standbys" to drill on the chief's favorite subject already discussed many times this year.
9. A discussion of the same old jokes, and a rehash of the old "war stories".
10. The chance for an early adjournment because "we know it all", or "it's too bad to go outside", or because "no one feels like doing anything tonight".

LADIES' RULES FOR WATERBALL

1. 90 lb. pressure on each nozzle.
2. 2 minutes playing time on each end of court. All teams play first half before 2nd half is started.
3. Object is to get ball in opponents' territory. Time is scored by seconds ball is out of dead time. If a goal is scored, time stops, ball is placed in center again and time continues until 2 minutes is over. A goal is 15 seconds.
4. A team consists of 5 playing members and 2 coaches. (1) nozzle, (2) back up girl, (3) hose dragger and nozzle replacement, (4) hose dragger or nozzle replacement if reg., (5) back hose nozzle guard. At least four of these girls must be from same department. 5th may be sub from your own district. Subs may be put in in case of sickness or injury in 4th position only and may not play in other positions.
